

## Information for Authors

### Purpose of the ISCAST Online Journal

The ISCAST Online Journal is designed to provide a forum for those exploring the interaction between science, technology and Christian faith. The intended readers are Christians interested in science and technology as well as scientists or technologists interested in the Christian faith. It is likely that readers will have a university degree or its equivalent but we do not assume that they will have a specialised knowledge of a branch of science or theology.

### Categories of Articles

**Three categories of articles are accepted for publication.**

- **Refereed articles** should be 3500 to 9000 words in length and will undergo a referee process before acceptance. Articles published elsewhere will be considered for publication and will undergo the same review process. Authors should ensure they have copyright to re-publish or permission to re-publish prior to submission. Format and layout of previously published articles may be altered to conform to the style of the ISCAST Online Journal.
- **Opinion and debate** articles will require minimal editorial input. They should be up to 2500 words in length. Manuscripts submitted for opinion and debate will be moderated by the Editor but will not undergo a formal referee process. They will however be examined for accuracy and consistency in language, style and layout, once they have been accepted by the Editor.
- **Book reviews** should be 400–600 words in length. Book reviews will not be formally reviewed but will be checked for grammar, spelling etc. and to ensure that they are suitable for publication.

### General guidelines

- The article should be intelligible to an educated reader concerned with the interaction between science and Christian faith, but not a specialist in a particular branch of science. Specialised terms may be used in the body of the article but only when essential.
- **Abstract:** All articles submitted for publication as a 'refereed article' should include an *abstract* of 150–200 words followed by a list of up to 10 *key words* for indexing. A list of up to 10 key words should also be supplied for articles submitted as 'opinion and debate' articles.
- The author's affiliation(s) and qualifications should be provided.
- The editors will follow the spelling and language guidelines of the *Style manual (Style manual for authors, editors and printers, 6<sup>th</sup> edn, 2002, Revised by Snooks & Co. John Wiley & Sons, Australia Ltd, Canberra)*

- Footnotes should be kept to a minimum and cited in the text using a superscript numeral. Footnotes should appear at the bottom of the page.

## Submission process

- An article should be submitted by email attachment to the editor (onlinejournal@iscast.org.au), as a word processor document or as an ASCII text file.
- Authors should state for which category (see above) they are submitting an article in the accompanying email. However the editor will decide whether and in what form to accept any paper.
- The editor will advise the author on a decision regarding the article following the review process and whether any changes are required. Once these changes have been made, the editor will advise of final acceptance.
- Articles will then proceed to copy-editing before publication. After the copy-editing process, all manuscripts will be returned to the author for final approval prior to publishing.
- Articles will be published in .pdf format.

## Reference format

- References should be cited in the text in brackets using the author-date format (Thompson 1989) and then listed alphabetically in a bibliography at the end of the article. For reference texts, page numbers can be included in the brackets, for example (Worthing 1980 pp. 56–59).
- Biblical references should be included in brackets in an abbreviated form. Indicate the version, for example (Jn 3:16 RSV, Gen. 2:6 NIV).
- Latin terms such as 'ibid' should not be used.
- References other than Biblical references should be listed in a bibliography at the end of the article in alphabetical order. Where there are more than three authors, the names of the first three authors should be given followed by et al.

Books should be cited in the following order: author, author's initials (no fullstops or spaces), date, title (*italics*), publisher, place of publication.

For example, Jeeves, MA, Berry, RJ 1998, *Science, life and Christian belief*, Baker Books, Grand Rapids MI.

Periodicals/ Journals should be cited in the following order: author, author's initials (no fullstops or spaces), year of publication, title of article in single quotation marks, title of journal (*italics*), volume number (issue number in brackets if given) page numbers.

For example, Gijsbers, A 2005, 'More on memes', *Science and Christian Belief*, vol. 17(1), pp. 83–84.

Standard works should be cited as follows:

Shakespeare, Anthony and Cleopatra. I, v.

Online publications should be cited in the following order: author, author's initials, date of the document (date of creation or of the most recent version), title of the document(*italics*), version number (if applicable), name of the sponsor of the source, date of viewing, URL
